Justification for use of a Project Labor Agreement for Contract No 60J15 within Cook County

The use of a Project Labor Agreement on this project is consistent with all State and Local statutory and regulatory requirements

Item 2. This project is federally funded

<u>Item 3:</u> The estimate project cost is \$8,300,000.

Any disruption in the continuity of this project due to labor issues would result in delayed deadlines that would cause safety concerns for the traveling public. Lapsing trade contracts during the first stage of the project would be addressed through the use of a Project Labor Agreement. It is the Illinois Department of Transportation's finding that the large skilled workforce needed for this project can be provided by union trades involved and is a necessary requirement for a Project Labor Agreement.

<u>Item 4:</u> A detour is proposed for the improvement. The detour routes have been reviewed and approved by the City of Chicago. The detour routes are as follows:

For westbound 63rd Street:

Use northbound Wentworth Avenue – to westbound 59th Street – to southbound Yale Avenue – to 63rd Street

For eastbound 63rd Street:

Use northbound Halsted Street – to eastbound 59th Street – to southbound State Street – to 63rd Street

The use of northbound / southbound streets for the eastbound detour closer to the bridge would be preferred, but all of the streets east of Halsted Street are residential.

The use of southbound Yale Avenue (frontage road) to northbound Wentworth Avenue – to 63rd Street was reviewed, but the left turn movement from southbound Yale Avenue to northbound Wentworth is not feasible; therefore, was not suggested

The use of southbound Yale Avenue (frontage road) to eastbound Marquette Road – to northbound State Street – to 63rd Street was also reviewed, but there is no left turn (westbound) allowed at State Street & 63rd Street

The proposed scope of work includes superstructure replacement and substructure repair, traffic signal modernization, improvement to two intersections, and pavement markings to the bridge structure carrying 63rd Street over I-90/94 (Dan Ryan Expressway) The length of the project is approximately 720 feet (0.14 mile)

The prospective completion date for the project is October 31, 2015 Please see the special provisions for the final completion date

Item 8. 63rd Street west of Wells Street/Yale Avenue and east of Wentworth Avenue is a four lane divided roadway. The bridge structure is located over I-90/94 and the Chicago Transit Authority (CTA) Red Line. There is an exit ramp from southbound I-90/94 at the Wells Street intersection. A CTA train station entrance and bus stop are located on the north side of the bridge. An entrance ramp to northbound I-90/94 is located just north of the Wentworth Avenue intersection. 63rd Street carries an average daily traffic (ADT) of approximately 11,000 vehicles and runs through a very busy part of the City of Chicago. As with any project under construction, some motorists will choose to find an alternate route to avoid driving in a construction zone. With a detour in place and due to the limited network of east-west routes in the City that provide on and off ramps to the expressway, there are no easily accessible, uncongested alternate routes. Therefore, additional volume added to adjacent routes raises concerns for safety and delay on those routes as well as 63rd Street.

<u>Item 12</u>. The project extends through one construction season. The trades that are expected to be used on this project include but are not limited to be the following: Laborers, Carpenters, Operators, Teamsters, Cement Masons, Electricians and Ironworkers. Any work stoppage due to expiring union contracts will have major impacts to the construction schedule and the timely completion of the project.
